<i>Lycium chinense</i>	5	<i>Self-fruitful</i>	<i>Early summer</i>	<i>Part sun to sun</i>	<i>Mounding trailing</i>	<p>It is also known as Chinese boxthorn, Chinese matrimony vine and Chinese tea plant. Fruit has on-going ripening, making weekly harvests for a month. Fruiting occurs when plants are 2-3 years old. Fruits can be used fresh, frozen or dry. Goji berries are similar in taste to raisins but more tart. They can be eaten raw or cooked and are a tasty addition to tea, soup and hot cereal.</p> 
<i>Lycium barbarum</i>	5	<i>Self-fruitful</i>	<i>Early summer</i>	<i>Part sun to sun</i>	<i>Mounding trailing</i>	<p>Also known as Chinese wolfberry this is one of two species of boxthorn in the family Solanaceae. They can be used fresh, frozen or dried. To dry gojis, harvest them and simply spread the fresh berries in a single layer on a sheet of newspaper. Keep in a cool, dry spot, out of bright light, until the berries are dry.</p>

<i>Honey Bee</i>	2	<i>Self - sterile</i>	<i>Mid June</i>	1.9 gr	<i>tart</i>	21.647	<p><i>'Honey Bee' holds onto its fruit firmly and stays on the bush longer than most other varieties. Was selected to be a pollinator for "Borealis", "Tundra" and "Indigo"</i></p> 
<i>Indigo Gem</i>	2	<i>Self - sterile</i>	<i>Mid June</i>	1.30 gr	<i>Sweet/tangy</i>	21.647	<p><i>Great variety for processing and harvesting. Grows more upright and faster than the others. Have excellent flavor and a firmer skin.</i></p> 
<i>Indigo Yum</i>	2	<i>Self - sterile</i>	<i>Mid June</i>	1.29 gr	<i>Tangy/sweet</i>	21.647	<p><i>Comes into production a little quicker than the others. Hardest of all to propagate. The berries on this variety are more stretched than the others.</i></p> 
<i>Tundra</i>	2	<i>Self - sterile</i>	<i>Mid June</i>	1.49 gr	<i>Sweet/tart</i>	21.647	<p><i>Best suited for commercial production. Its fruit is at least 50% larger than blue honeysuckles currently available in Canada. Does not bleed from the stem end when picked.</i></p> 
<i>Berry Blue</i>	2	<i>Self - sterile</i>	<i>Mid June</i>	<i>Smaller than U of S varieties</i>	<i>Not as sweet as U of S varieties</i>	21.647	<p><i>Fruits have tube shape and they are not as sweet as U of S varieties. Tasty tart berries are good fresh or processed and very productive. Serves as pollinizer for all other varieties.</i></p>
